REVENUE CONSTRAINTS AND BRIGHT SPOTS



PARKING REVENUE DECLINE 445% From pre-pandemic levels

LODGING TAXES DOWN

Hotel, Airbnb taxes have not recovered to 2019 levels









High inflation over the past 3 years drove increases in all expenses. Further increases in some areas include:
